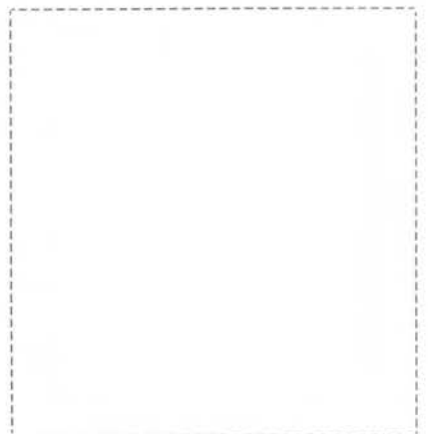
**GOD CREATED THE SEA LIFE OF THE WORLD; LIVING CREATURES FILLED THE WATERS.**

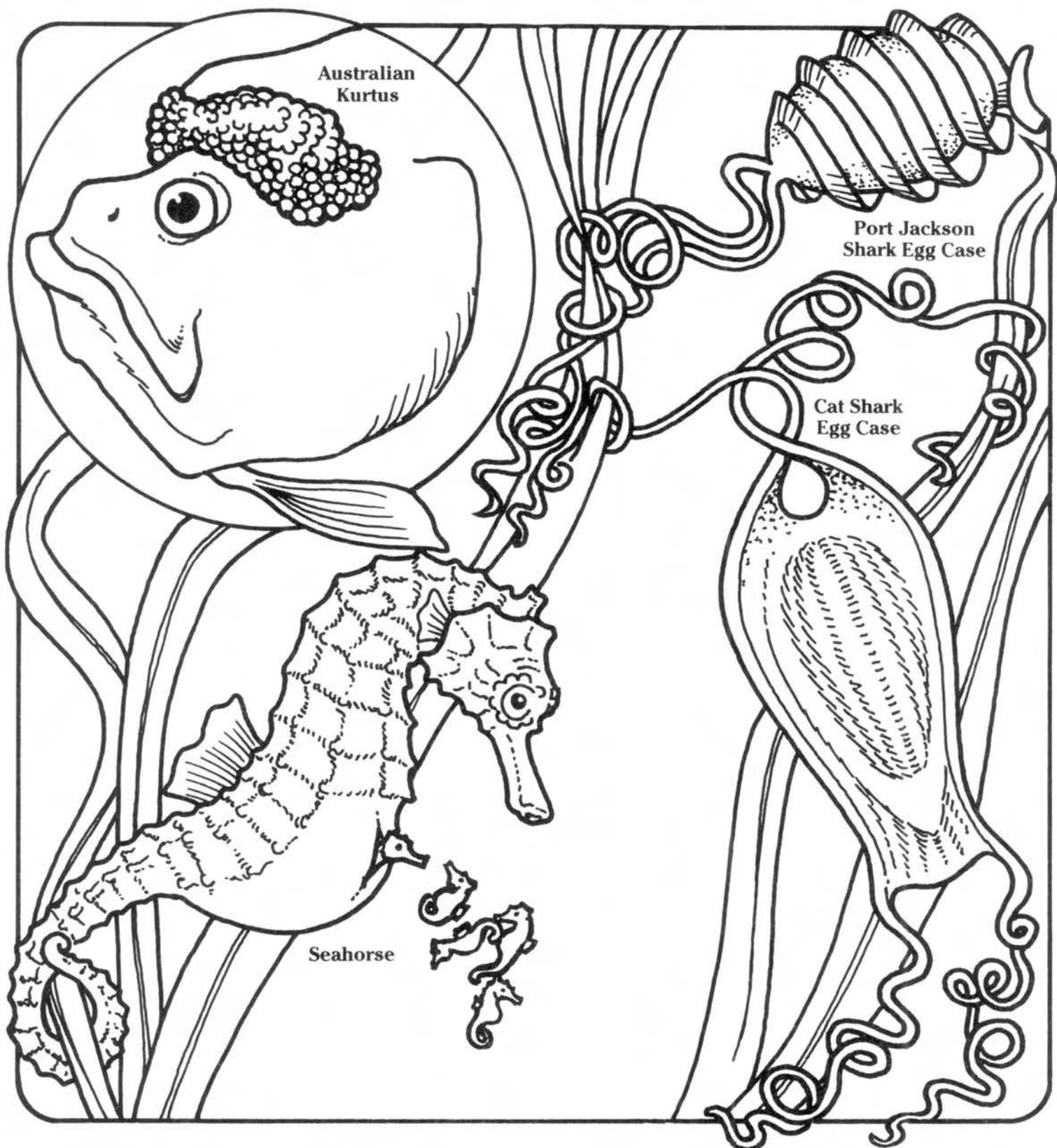
God made heaven and earth; and on the fifth day of Creation, God said, "Let the waters bring forth abundantly the moving creature that hath life..." (Genesis 1:20). God created many different kinds of sea life, for seventy per cent of the earth's surface is covered with water. Most marine life is found in two zones or areas. Some creatures live in the tidal zone, where land and sea meet; others live in the shallow seas zone, which goes down about 500 feet (152.4 meters).

Along with sea life, God also made birds. Then on the sixth day, God created all the land animals and finally, Adam and Eve, the first man and woman. Perhaps the sea came up to the Garden of Eden where Adam and Eve lived, and they may have been able to see many marine creatures. Perhaps they even played with friendly dolphins. God planned for some sea creatures to multiply, to have babies like themselves, by laying eggs. Some sharks lay eggs in leathery purses that have long tendrils which anchor them in seaweed until a baby hatches from each one. The Australian Kurtus keeps a close eye on its eggs, for they safely incubate on its forehead! The male seahorse has a "pocket" where eggs put there by the female develop. In time, tiny baby seahorses come out of their father's brood pouch.
