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Using This Teacher Guide

Features: The suggested weekly schedule enclosed has easy-to-manage lessons that guide the reading, worksheets, and all assessments. The pages of this guide are perforated and three-hole punched so materials are easy to tear out, hand out, grade, and store. Teachers are encouraged to adjust the schedule and materials needed in order to best work within their unique educational program.

Lesson Scheduling: Students are instructed to read the pages in their book and then complete the corresponding section provided by the teacher. Assessments that may include worksheets, activities, quizzes, and tests are given at regular intervals with space to record each grade. Space is provided on the weekly schedule for assignment dates, and flexibility in scheduling is encouraged. Teachers may adapt the scheduled days per each unique student situation. As the student completes each assignment, this can be marked with an “X” in the box.

Course Description

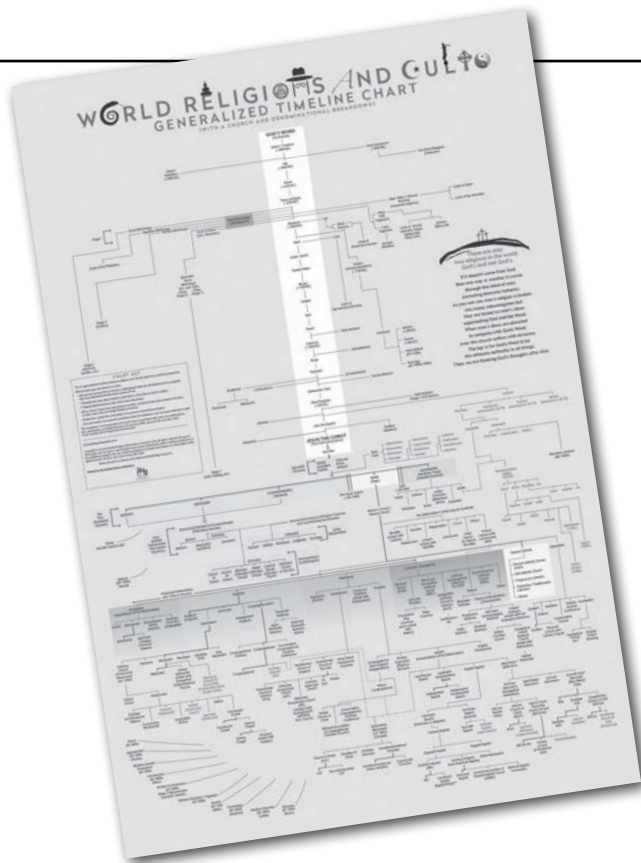
Note: This course is very reading intensive. Because of this, a teacher might evaluate specific readings they would prefer to cover, or perhaps adjust the schedule provided to cover a two-year period.

This course will examine over 50 world religious views, always with a focus on the Word of God's truth as the standard, and with a heart of compassion to share the Gospel to all.

A world religion is a belief system that attempts to explain some aspect of reality and often how the physical and spiritual world operates; and yet it is independent of another world religion (though they often have different sects, cults, or denominations). But for all practical purposes, this is usually how a world religion is defined. For example, Buddhism, secular humanism, and biblical Christianity are entirely different religions that do not share a common historical foundation. Each of these religions has variations within its constituents — Buddhism has Mahayana and Theravada forms; biblical Christianity has Lutheran, Baptist, Presbyterian, etc.; and secular humanism has atheism, agnosticism, and the like.

A cult is typically defined as a religious offshoot of a major world religion that no longer holds to the core tenets of that world religion. They would no longer be seen as orthodox by the majority of that religion's practitioners and are often seen as distant from them. For example, there are several cults of Christianity where there has been such a great deviation on core doctrines that they would no longer be considered orthodox. Usually this is due to one person's teachings that initially led people away from those core tenets.

This course cannot examine every world religion, cult, sect, or system, so we have selected quite a few from different belief systems, which we will critique. Our hope through these books is that many will be equipped to not only understand the errors within these religious views, but also to point the followers to the only hope of salvation — Jesus Christ. Jesus said, "And I, if I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all peoples to Myself" (John 12:32).

Suggested Grading Rubric for Essays

A part of the student grade on most worksheets in this course involves a writing/essay component. Below is a helpful rubric to use when grading these written responses. The rubric is not meant to simply grade as one would true or false or multiple-choice answers, but instead focuses on the overall development and organization of the argument. However, you may factor grammar, mechanics, and spelling into the rubric if you wish, all of which are worth 40 points. The other portion of the worksheets are worth 60 points for a total of 100 points each.

Student responses should:

- address all aspects of the prompt and stay focused on the prompt
- support all claims with sufficient evidence and reasoning, using relevant and factually correct examples
- provide an effective introduction and conclusion in the response
- organize the information well, using clear transitions and a logical progression of ideas

Grading:

A (36–40 points): Response fulfills all the above requirements consistently well. Shows a mastery of how to construct a written response.

B (32–35 points): Response mostly or relatively fulfills the above requirements. Shows a good understanding how to construct a written response but could still use improvement.

C (28–31 points): Response somewhat or adequately fulfills the above requirements. Shows a basic understanding of how to construct a written response but still needs additional improvement.

D (24–27 points): Response insufficiently or only occasionally fulfills the above requirements. Shows a deficient understanding of how to construct a written response and needs considerable improvement.

F (23 or lower): Response does not fulfill the above requirements and/or shows a poor grasp of how to construct an argument and needs significant improvement.

When each essay is assigned a point value it can be added to the other worksheet portion, and the grade out of 100 percent can be stated as follows:

90%–100% = A

80%–89% = B

70%–79% = C

60%–69% = D

59% and lower is an F

Worksheet 1

Summary of Biblical Christianity Beliefs

God

God is triune, existing in three persons of the Godhead — Father, Son, and Holy Spirit; God is eternal and transcendent; the Son took on flesh to dwell on earth.

Authority/Revelation

God and His revelation of Himself in the 66 books of the Bible.

Man

Man is created in the image of God; mankind is fallen as a result of Adam's sin; man is unable to do good and please God on his own.

Sin

Any thought or action that is contrary to the will of God as revealed in the Bible.

Salvation

Salvation is possible through the substitutionary atonement of Jesus on the Cross and His Resurrection; individuals receive salvation by repentance and faith in Jesus' work on their behalf; works have no merit for salvation; salvation is a free gift received by God's grace alone; eternal punishment in hell awaits those who die in their sins, while eternal joyful existence with God awaits those who receive salvation.

Creation

The universe and all that is in it was created out of nothing in six, 24-hour days about 6,000 years ago; all living things were created according to their kinds in supernatural acts of God; mankind was specially created by God in supernatural acts.

Essay answers will vary, but should include information that address some or all of the following: The Bible is God's Word, it consists of 66 books of the Old and New Testaments, it is true in all it teaches, it is our supreme authority, it alone is the divine rule of faith and obedience, the Bible message is clear, and all Scripture centers upon Christ.

Worksheet 2

Summary of Roman Catholic Beliefs

God

Trinitarian Godhead consistent with Bible. Jesus is an insufficient Savior.

Authority/Revelation

The Bible is viewed as a revelation from God, but heavy emphasis is placed on tradition and teaching of the line of popes holding apostolic authority. Apocryphal books are considered part of the canon.

Man

A sinful being who cooperates with God in the process of salvation.

Sin

Transgression of God's will consistent with the Bible, but divided into categories of mortal and venial. Must be confessed to a priest as a mediator between man and Jesus.

Salvation

A cooperation of man with God through sacraments. Sacraments are ministered through apostolic succession to members of the only true church. Jesus' atonement is insufficient to pay for sins. Purgatory following death is necessary for purification from sin. Merit of saints can be applied to others for payment for sin.

Creation

Originally believed in a literal, six-day creation, but influence of evolutionary views is now common. Several popes have made pronouncements that all forms of evolution are compatible with the Bible as long as Adam and Eve are preserved.

Essay answers will vary, but should include information that address some or all of the following: The supreme authority in the Church, the question of origins and evolution, and teaching of Mary including the immaculate conception, perpetual virginity of Mary, the assumption of Mary, and the veneration of Mary.

Worksheet 3

Summary of Eastern Orthodox Beliefs

God

Trinitarian Godhead consistent with Bible.

Authority/Revelation

The Bible is considered a part of tradition, though the highest and most important tradition. The apocrypha is also considered part of Scripture, though on a lower level; tradition, particularly in the Church Fathers, gives the authoritative way to interpret Scripture.

Man

A fallen creature, yet not without the ability to cooperate with God in the process of deification (becoming “god,” i.e., reaching salvation).

Sin

Transgression of God’s will; sin is not seen as the powerful force controlling and enslaving people’s will (cf. Romans 7; Ephesians 2:1–10).

Salvation

A cooperation of man with God; most important in this process is participation in the sacraments; the sacraments must be received from duly ordained ministers (priests and bishops) of the Orthodox Church who stand in the line of apostolic succession; beyond the sacraments, the individual believer must strive to become increasingly “holy”; the doctrine of the Atonement (the substitutionary death of Christ on the Cross for our sins) is not emphasized, but rather the Incarnation and Resurrection are the focus.

Creation

Originally believed in a literal, six-day creation, but influence of evolutionary views is increasing.

Essay answers will vary, but should include information that address some or all of the following: Issues regarding the incarnation of Jesus, the Resurrection and redemption, and the nature of the Cross.

Worksheet 4

Summary of Islamic Beliefs

God

Deny the Trinity; believe Allah is the only god (monotheistic) and that Jesus is not the Son of God, but a prophet; Allah is transcendent and removed from mankind.

Authority/Revelation

The Bible is viewed as a revelation from God that has been corrupted, but the revelations of Muhammad in the Koran supersede the Bible; the Hadith are revered as traditions that tell of Muhammad’s life and act as a sort of authorized commentary on the Koran.

Man

Man is the highest creature made by Allah and is able to do good with his free will, though he needs guidance from Allah’s prophets.

Sin

Transgression of Allah’s will as revealed in the Koran and Hadith; no concept of original sin corrupting mankind; following the guidance of prophets will help you avoid sin and do good; the Five Pillars give a framework for obeying Allah.

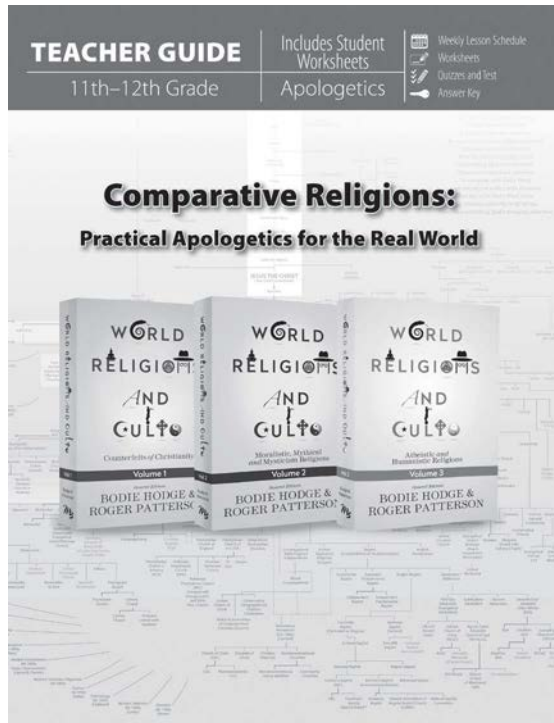
Salvation

Each person will be judged by Allah for his or her own actions; Allah will allow some into Paradise (Heaven) and send others to hellfire based on the balance of how many good and bad deeds they have done; there is no concept of a mediator or Savior and they deny that Jesus died on the Cross; martyrs receive entrance into Paradise.

Creation

The Koran speaks of creation in six days, but many modern scholars allow for an allegorical interpretation and evolutionary views; conservative scholars would reject evolutionary ideas and hold a view very similar to the biblical timeline.

Essay answers will vary, but should include information that address some or all of the following: Ideas on good works and evil works, justice, heaven, the love of God, earning heaven, and the biblical message.
