**G**od made the platypus to look like many different animals all rolled into one. It has fur like a bear, a tail like a beaver, spurs like a rooster, poison like a snake, webbed feet like an otter, and a bill like a duck.

# KANGAROO

**T**he kangaroo carries its baby in a pouch. A baby kangaroo is called a joey and likes to hop.

Say this out loud:  
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**W**hen a joey is born, it is only the size of a jelly bean. The joey also knows how to crawl into its mothers pouch.




# SPIDER

**S**piders have eight legs and spin strong and waterproof webs to capture food.

**S**piders can spin different kinds of threads for their webs: a sticky kind, a dry kind to walk on, and a soft kind to wrap up captured insects. Their eight legs help them to walk on the webs, and sensitive feet let them know what kind of thread they are walking on.

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# PORCUPINE

The porcupine is covered in sharp quills. They use their quills to protect themselves.

Some porcupines can have as many as 150 quills per square inch. That can add up to 30,000 quills! Ouch! Also, since porcupines sometimes fall on their own quills, God designed the quills to be a little antibiotic so the porcupines don't get infected.
